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

Recap of the 2019 Colorado Legislative session in employment law

Presented by Michael Santo, Bechtel Santo & Severn



The 2019 Colorado legislative session with respect to employment laws was a frequently-changing landscape right up until the end. Fortunately, with the session now officially over, we

now have a much better idea of the landscape ahead for Colorado employers. In this Lunch & Learn, Michael Santo, from Bechtel Santo & Severn, will discuss the legislative session with particular emphasis on the following:

The Equal Pay Act. At the end of the session, this Bill passed through both houses. So, it is currently awaiting the Governor's signature. While most are aware of the Bill's goals (i.e., implement measures to prevent pay disparities based on gender), the Bill also contained a number of requirements that will impact the policies and practices of all Colorado employers that did not get it as much publicity.

The FAMLI Bill. This bill would have provided up to 12 weeks of paid leave for all Colorado employees. In the end, a bill with such leave didn't pass. But the efforts at the end of the session certainly show that this is likely not the last we will see of efforts to implement

such leave requirements in Colorado.

Limits On Job Applicant Criminal History Inquiries. Similar to the Equal Pay Act, this Bill passed through both houses and is currently awaiting the Governor's signature. If signed, it will impact how and when employers may inquire about an applicant's criminal conviction history.

These and many other issues will be discussed at an upcoming Chamber of Commerce Lunch & Learn. Michael Santo will also provide tips, insights, policies/practices, etc. to ensure that your organization is ready for and complying with the new legal changes.

A STRONG PAY STRATEGY IS SO IMPORTANT

You've probably heard the common idiom "two heads are better than one." Well, we believe two pay strategies are also better than one: one that gets candidates in the door and one that keeps them coming back to work each day.

STARTING WAGES MATTER.

We asked applicants in Durango, CO, to provide their desired hourly wage (the wage at which they will accept work) to help us understand starting wage expectations in the local market because as an attractive pay rate entices candidates. Despite Colorado's comparatively high minimum wage of \$11.10 per hour, only 14% of local workers will work for it; furthermore, it takes a pay rate of \$15.00 per hour to attract the attention of half of the local talent pool. A good starting wage is only half the retention equation though; raises also play a role.

RAISES MATTER, TOO!

Across the nation, 88% of our industrial employers offer at least one pay increase in a worker's first year on the job, but nearly 60% of those offer only one increase during the first year, with many employers waiting until an employee's first anniversary. Our data show that the average worker quits his or her assignment after seven weeks on the job—long before that raise kicks in. Conversely, when workers received an increase within the first 30 days on a job, they stayed twice as long as those workers who didn't receive an increase at all, and each additional increase an associate received was followed by an average of about 90 more days on the assignment.

The numbers don't lie; a good starting wage will not relieve your retention woes on its own, but when paired with a progressive pay program, longevity in the workplace seems all the more attainable!

Whole Health Family Medicine Clinic Doctor Dan Schaefer

"We opened Whole Health Family Medicine Clinic in Durango just over three years ago," Dan says. "It's been an exciting three years; we absolutely love being a part of this community! Karassa grew up in Mancos and we made more of a personal than professional decision to move to Durango. We wanted our kids to grow up here. Along with the move, we made a choice to change our business model to respond to the need for a more user-friendly healthcare option for the community."

Whole Health Family Medicine is a direct primary care clinic providing the full spectrum of high quality, personalized healthcare to patients of all ages, with all routine care covered by a low-cost monthly membership fee. Dan, a board certified family physician, and Karassa, a Physician Assistant, learned about this alternative model five years ago, after over a decade of practicing in a traditional medical setting. Direct primary care bypasses the rigid requirements associated with insurance companies that drive up healthcare costs and limit the amount of time doctors can spend with patients. Nationally, the numbers are growing dramatically for this kind of direct primary care practice. Colorado is one of the states experiencing the fastest growth.

Typically, patients first become members of Whole Health Family Clinic to save money on healthcare costs - but Dan says that ultimately the greater benefit is a superior healthcare experience. "Working together to prevent or actively manage health problems requires a partnership between us and our patients," Dan says. "It's a bi-directional, collaborative approach. We provide an alternative to the experience that most people have with the mainstream practice of medicine. We spend much more time with our patients. We're available when our patients need us. We take the time to really listen to what our patients have to say. We certainly enjoy helping our patients save money, but our main focus is providing the optimal healthcare experience for our patients."

Whole Health Family Medicine provides a number of convenient, added value services, such as an in-office lab. Most in-office lab-work is covered in the membership and a well-stocked in-office pharmacy offers medicines at only slightly above wholesale prices, usually just a few dollars per script. Members of Whole Health Family Medicine Clinic also enjoy access to routine lab work at reduced prices through a local lab facility. EKGs and some other additional services are included in the membership fee. If, for example, an EKG is indicated, it

can be done immediately right in the office at no additional charge. When patients need to see a specialist or an alternative practitioner (acupuncture, for example) or require a service not available at Whole Health Family Medicine (like x-rays), staff members help them navigate the options.

The majority of the clinic's patients have individual memberships, but a growing number of local businesses (Durango Joe's, for instance) offer healthcare benefits to their employees through employer-sponsored memberships. "They're not required to do that," Dan says. "They just want to take good care of their employees, but Insurance plans are often prohibitively expensive for small businesses. We're excited about collaborating with these small businesses in such a meaningful way."

Dan and Karassa have two sons, five and seven. "Our boys love Durango and are involved with different sports, including soccer, baseball, basketball, and biking on the trails," Dan says. "We have a pony and a horse. Karassa's family runs an active cattle ranch in Mancos. Aunts and uncles and grandparents run it, so the boys have become little cowboys."

On May 20, Dan and Karassa participated in a healthcare forum, along with Local First, the Durango Network and the Durango Chamber of Commerce, with the mission of exploring innovative grassroots healthcare solutions for local business owners.

"I can't say enough about how helpful Jack and Rita and the Chamber community has been," Dan says. "I have to say the support is wonderful. I enjoy going to Coffee at Carvers every month and make it to most of the Business After Hours. The Durango business community really does a fantastic job of focusing on meeting the needs of the community more than focusing on profit-margins and financial gain. I really resonate with that and appreciate being a part of this community. My objective is to provide high-quality medical care and outstanding customer service.
