## Make every day count

As I originally set out to write this, I was reminded by the quote from the sage prognosticator Ferris Bueller, "Life moves pretty fast. If you don't stop and look around, you'll miss it."

Unfortunately I also was reminded by the colloquial "law of threes" – which claims that unfortunate things (or bad luck) comes in "threes." Before I could get this column written, it became the "law of fours," at least at this go-round. In the last couple of months, Durango lost four of our most amazing community citizens. New folks to town won't ever have had the opportunity to meet them, but you all will continue to benefit from their legacy and what these amazing men did for Durango and La Plata County: Don Jeter, Mickey Hogan, Ed Zink and Bob Dolphin.

Don Jeter had a contagious attitude. He served in the Marines and the attitude to serve continued as he was always willing to lend a hand. Not only the owner of CAL Steel and Sheet Metal he was a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason and a Past Master at the Durango San Juan Lodge #46. He also had a passion for children as the Past President of the San Juan Basin Shrine Club. I can picture him in parades as he drove his "Tin Lizzie" smiling and waving to the crowd.

Mickey Hogan was a patriarch of one of Durango's foremost families. Sorrel Sky Gallery now occupies the building in Downtown that housed the best place to purchase jeans and Carhart's and ANYTHING you needed (and he grew up there on the second floor!). He was also key in working to build Durango's tourism industry. (He remembered The Strater "in the day.") And we might not have had Purgatory had it not been for Mickey and his small group of "friends" who wanted to make Durango

the place "to be." Hogan's even wrapped your purchase in paper, something you don't see today.

Ed Zink was also born and raised in Durango. Waterfall Ranch and the restored wetlands on the Animas Valley property that used to be the family's hay farm stand as testament to how he cared so much for this community. But there also wouldn't be a Mountain Bike Specialists or Iron Horse Bicycle Classic without Ed's vision and persistence and work to make the business succeed and Durango's Downtown thrive, and the Iron Horse an iconic world class event. And because of Ed, Durango is the Mountain Bike Mecca, as he brought the World Mountain Bike Championships here.

I worked with Bob Dolphin at Fort Lewis College. Though suffering the consequences of polio early in life, and struggled at times, he shall always be honored as a visionary administrator at FLC who brought to fruition many of the successes the college has today – including the Community Concert Hall, Center for Southwest Studies and more. He served on City Council and truly made a difference in this town.

After I learned of Bob's recent passing, I found another quote, anonymous, but appropriate, "Life is short. Spend it with people who make you laugh and feel loved."

We've always been a town of people who love each other, no matter our social, religious, racial or political leanings. Let's remember that and live like Don, Mickey, Ed and Bob would like us to live, making Durango the best place it can be, with the best people on the planet.



### WHAT IS HYPERBARIC OXYGEN THERAPY (HBOT)?

## LLP MONTHLY FOCUS

### What is True Leadership? ... Service

Many fight their way to the top, but the ones who become true leaders, serve. Anyone can use fear to bully others to do something. The leaders who effortlessly get people enamored with them, willing to do difficult tasks for them, wanting to remain in relationship with them for the long haul ... serve first.

They look for the needs of those around them and match their talents and skills to meet those needs. They show up ready to help. Many who come to Leadership La Plata want to serve.

They are looking for a way to connect deeper to their community. Many who show up in LLP want to find a place they fit. This is often the hard spot ... how do I align my talents with what is needed? As students go through LLP, they learn about themselves, the needs of their community, and are challenged to reflect on how they might be of service to others.

They are asked to look deeper at themselves and determine how they can best show up in the world. This is different than reacting based on past learning and habit as most do. LLP participants are asked to look beyond how they have reacted in the past, look through the way they have always been, and choose to respond (rather than react) in a way that is effective for what is in front of them right now: *How does this person communicate? What are the needs of this situation? How will I be most effective here?* This reflective questioning creates a

much better dynamic to connect to the project, person, or situation, and translates into getting more done on a quicker timeline.

This connection is the place where transformation gets done and our world gets better. This is true service - showing up in full authenticity, being present to what is happening and who needs what right now, and then acting from a reflective, self aware place that says "Here is how I can contribute. Here are my skills and abilities and I can apply them to help you". This level of connection is authentic service.

When I show up fully, in authenticity, I will be able to say yes to things I can do and no to things I cannot. I will be able to remain focused on my role while remembering others also have skills and abilities to contribute. Their role is different than mine yet just as important. This is true collaboration, true leadership, and true connection. This makes our teams, projects, and communities stronger.

Today see how you can lead. Find a place you can be of service to a group, person, situation and give of your authentic skills and abilities to help from a place of self awareness (honest appraisal of your vulnerabilities and authenticities). It does not have to be a big thing, the work here is reconnecting to self while reaching out to help someone else. This is true leadership.

This month wraps up the Chamber Rocks Award nominations (Due November 11th). If you know an LLP grad who has taken the above seriously and is bringing their talents forward to make the community better from a true place of leadership (see above), nominate them for the Barbara Conrad Award!

### Barbara Conrad Leadership Award

Those who never had the privilege to know Barbara Conrad missed an exceptional experience. A member of the Class of '91-'92, Barbara truly epitomized the commitment to community that Leadership La Plata, at its very core, embraces. She is remembered widely in the community as the former director of the Durango Arts Center, the main gallery of which bears her name, but she was so much more.

To honor Barbara, Leadership La Plata established the Barbara Conrad Leadership Award, given annually in conjunction with the Durango Chamber of Commerce Annual Awards Celebration.

Each year, the recipient is selected by a committee made up of the former recipients, including Bill Mashaw, Linda Geer, Char Day, David Eppich, Pam Patton, Ed Morlan, Sidney Zink, Lon Erwin, Nora Tracy, Dennis Lum, Marsha

Porter-Norton, Indiana Reed, Kip Koso, Wanda Ellingson, Diane Becket, Christi Zeller, John and Cissy Anderson, Kris Oyler, Laura Lewis Marchino, Stan Crapo, Tara Kiene, Jenn Bartlett and Molly Martin. The committee does not nominate, so members of the community are strongly encouraged to suggest individuals who meets the criteria.

The successful recipient must be a LLP graduate who is consistently involved and active in leadership roles throughout the community, as was Barbara. The recipient must also be one who demonstrates collaborative leadership skills and creative, independent thinking – or thinking "outside the box." Of prime importance is dedication to the Leadership La Plata program.

Nomination deadline is November 11, 2019. The award is presented annually in January at the Chamber Rocks Event.

## BUSINESS CONNECTION

### Designs by RVB, Reneé V. Bruch

I ask Reneé Bruch, owner of Designs By RVB, what she loves most about owning her own design and marketing business. “I get to work personally with clients,” she says. “In graphic design, when you work for a company that is not your own, often a middleman is involved. Everything takes more time in translation and it can be frustrating for everyone. I enjoy the more personal relationship with clients that I have now. My clients get the most bang for their bucks when I listen directly to what they want and then use my experience and creativity to produce that for them.”

Reneé grew up in New Jersey and moved west in 1996 to attend CSU. After graduating with a degree in fine arts with a focus in graphic design, Reneé got a ‘government’ job, creating interpretive, educational displays at government agency buildings in several different Colorado communities. “I met my husband, Travis, in Glenwood Springs,” Reneé says, “when I was working for the Bureau of Land Management and he was working for the Forest Service. We were set up on a blind date.” Climbing the ladder with the Forest Service often requires moving from one location to another, so Reneé and Travis relocated several times. Somewhere along the way they made a just-for-fun trip to Durango. “We fell in love with the area. We loved that it was in the mountains and also close to the desert. So Travis applied for a job in Durango. It took seven years, because there’s only one position in Durango in his particular field of the Forest Service. Finally he got a phone call offering him the position. We moved here in June of 2015, and he became program manager for the Timber Program at the Forest Service. We love Durango and are here to stay. Although retirement is way down the line for us, we know that this is where we want to retire.”

By the time Reneé started Designs by RVB three years ago, she’d already accumulated twenty years of experience in her field. “I just love what I do....which is everything from a full range of graphic design—including developing brands and logos, advertising of all types, marketing materials of all types, business cards and brochures. I do screen printing, banners, plaques, custom signs, vehicle, boat and window vinyl graphics.”

Reneé strives to think outside the box and introduce new ideas and processes to her clients. One of the niches she’s developing within the sign industry involves carving unique, solid wood house signs (you can see examples of these on her website).

Reneé has a wide variety of clients and produces a broad spectrum of products and services. “I do a little of everything,” she says. “The Forest Service is currently my biggest client. I’m working on trailhead signs for six different trail locations. They are large three panel signs that include maps, a bit about the area, trail management and leave no trace information. I also create vinyl logos for vehicles in their fleet.”

In addition to working closely with clients in her professional capacity, Reneé looks for ways to give back to the community, volunteering her graphic design and marketing skills for several local organizations and handling all the marketing for the 9 Health Fair. She is donating her time as the Executive Graphic Designer for the Ted X Talks in Durango in November 2019.

“I’m a big believer in being part of the Chamber,” Reneé says, “It’s good to have the support they provide and good to support them back. I go to Chamber functions and have participated in Girls Gone Golfing as a participant and by collaborating with Jennifer on designing and creating the picture frames for that event the past three years.”

Reneé and Travis love to ski, hike, camp, and garden. Travis hunts and fly fishes; Reneé has bikes, a raft and a paddle board. Reneé sums it up with, “So many hobbies, so little time!” They have a dog, Rex, who enjoys the active outdoor life as much as they do.
