

State-by-State Estimate for Total Unemployment Insurance Impact

Democrats successfully secured an extension of the historic unemployment insurance expansion established by the CARES Act, through March 14, 2021, to help struggling workers nationwide. This legislation includes an additional \$300 per week in unemployment assistance to supplement all state and federal unemployment benefits, as well as an extension of the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation programs.

Democrats successfully fought to bring back the enhanced federal unemployment insurance bump, which expired in July. This bill provides an additional \$300 per week for all workers receiving unemployment benefits, through March 14, 2021.

State-by-State Direct Payment Estimates*

Democrats secured an additional round of Economic Impact Payments of \$600 for individuals making up to \$75,000 per year and \$1,200 for couples making up to \$150,000 per year, as well as a \$600 payment for each child dependent. Democrats also successfully pushed for a provision, which is retroactive to the CARES Act, to expand these direct payments to mixed-status households, importantly providing immigrant families across the country with access to this financial relief.

State-by-State Rental Assistance Funding Estimates

Democrats successfully secured the establishment of a new and historic program to provide emergency rental assistance to Americans in need across the country. This emergency rental assistance program, which will be run through the U.S. Treasury Department, will utilize the resources and experience of the Treasury Department in distributing emergency aid to states and localities, while leveraging the existing local housing organizations that can best distribute these funds on behalf of tenants. With \$25 billion in assistance provided to assist renters in need, these funds will be targeted to families impacted by COVID that are struggling to make the rent and may have past due rent compounding on itself. These families will be able to utilize this assistance for past due rent, future rent payments, as well as utility and energy expenses.

State-by-State Education Relief Funding Estimates

Democrats secured \$81.88 billion in education funding to provide relief to states, K-12 schools, and higher education institutions that have all been significantly impacted by coronavirus. These funds are flexible and can be used on a variety of activities to provide educational services to students and support the on-going functionality of school districts and colleges and universities. Similar to the CARES Act, the education funding is split into three funds as follows:

- *Governors Emergency Education Relief Fund: \$4.05 billion*
 - *Includes a \$2.75 billion set aside for states, acting through the state educational agencies, to provide public health and related services to private K-12 schools.*
- *Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (Public K-12 schools): \$54.3 billion*
 - *Funds are distributed based on states' allocations under Title I, Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act and allocated to school districts based on their Title I, Part A allocation. Equitable services are no longer required to be provided under ESSER.*
- *Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund: \$22.7 billion*
 - *\$20.2 billion distributed to all public and private non-profit institutions of higher education.*
 - *\$1.7 billion additional set-aside for HBCUs, tribal colleges, and minority-serving institutions.*
 - *\$680 million to for-profit institutions of higher education solely to provide financial aid grants to students.*
 - *\$113.5 million for institutions with the greatest unmet needs or those not served by the primary formula, such as independent graduate schools.*
- *Relief for outlying areas and the Bureau of Indian Education: \$818.8 million*

State-by-State Vaccine and Testing, Tracing, and Covid Mitigation Programs Funding Estimates

Democrats secured \$4.5 Billion for vaccine distribution and administration and \$21.61 Billion for testing, tracing, and Covid mitigation programs. Of the total amount for testing, \$2.5 Billion will be sent out as grants specifically targeted at needs in underserved areas, including both communities of color and rural communities.

State-by-State CCDBG Cares Act Allotments and Estimated CCDBG Allotments from a \$10 Billion Supplemental Appropriation

Democrats successfully secured \$10 billion in emergency funds for the child care sector through the CCDBG program. These funds maintain the flexibility given to states through the CARES Act and can be used to provide child care assistance to families, and to help child care providers cover their increased operating costs during the pandemic. This emergency relief will help stabilize the child care market and allows states to expand child care assistance to essential workers and working families who are in great need of child care services.
